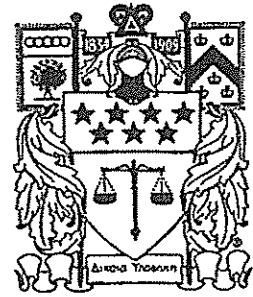

DU's Highest Award to Bob Phillips '60

A highlight of the 2001 DU Leadership Institute set for July 26 through 29 in Dallas, TX, will be the awarding of the Delta Upsilon Distinguished Alumnus Award to Brother Robert S. Phillips, Class of 1960. In addition to receiving the honor, Brother Phillips will be the main speaker at the Institute's Grand Banquet on Saturday evening (7 p.m.) at The Westin Galleria Hotel.

Brother Phillips is a widely published writer of poetry, fiction and criticism; an anthologizer and editor; a professor and scholar; and a former advertising creative director. From 1991 to 1996 he was director of the creative writing program at the University of Houston. Recently he was named the John and Rebecca Mores University Scholars at the U of Houston. His most recent book of poetry is *Spinach Days* (Johns Hopkins Univ. Press).

He has made several gifts to the SU Library, including his collection of over 30 years of correspondence with his good friend Joyce Carol Oates. Several years ago he received the Arents Award, SU's highest alumni award.

His many undergraduate credits include Class Marshall, VP of the SU Senior Class, Editor-in-Chief of the campus literary magazine—*Syracuse 10*, Tau Theta Upsilon (senior men's honorary), and both the English and advertising honoraries. In DU, he was chapter Vice President, Secretary, and Pledgemaster and long-standing "Bazoo" Editor. He also was the recipient of the Naim Cup Award (outstanding senior DU).

Syracuse DUs living in the Dallas area are urged to attend the Institute's Grand Banquet on Saturday July 28th to honor Brother Phillips. ♦

Recolonization Update

Efforts to successfully reestablish our chapter at Syracuse University continue to move forward, but not without challenges and hurdles.

Following DU Executive Director Abe Cross's excellent presentation to the SU Greek Expansion Committee last September 12 and subsequent denial by the committee, a "clear the air" luncheon was held at the Goldstein Alumni Center (former DKE house) between local DUs, Greek Advisor's staff, and undergraduate IFC and PanHel officers in early October. At that time, we were advised that the matter of DU recolonization now rested

with the SU Office of Judicial Affairs. It had been our understanding that the deactivation of the chapter in 1996 wiped the slate clean and cleared the way for future reestablishment of the chapter.

Upon learning of this, DU International Headquarters immediately contacted the Judicial Affairs Office to ascertain what problems remained, if any.

Judicial Affairs finally responded with a request for a lengthy petition from DU covering many areas, including specific plans to insure a quality chapter, number and identity of key local alumni, and DU's plans

to deal with the off-campus SU student group that uses our name. (A Daily Orange article of 2/6/01 reported that there are three non-sanctioned off-campus groups acting as "fraternities." Delta U was one of these, as were Sigma Chi and Alpha Tau Omega, the latter with its national's blessing!)

Executive Director Abe Cross and his staff responded most expeditiously with an excellent petition. A meeting with Judicial Affairs and the Greek Office was scheduled for April 6th.

On April 6, Abe Cross flew to Syracuse for the 1 PM meeting. Bruce Laidlaw '55, Knowlton Foote '60, and Peter Zarins '61 represented the DU Society. Also present were SU's

Recolonization—Two Chapters Needed

On paper, in its most idealistic form, a college fraternity is a thing of pride and joy. A group of fine young men—gentlemanly, good scholars, leaders in all aspects of campus life (“a DU in everything”) with an enlightened social program the envy of the campus. Add to that a magnificent, beautifully-furnished chapter house and a healthy balance sheet and you have a winning, positive force on campus, a great venue for young men as they transition into manhood.

Unfortunately this is often not the reality as, yielding to pop culture, the chapter veers off track and slowly sinks into the morass of indifference, lack of pride and respect, poor scholarship, unpaid bills, and over-indulgence. For some, the vows taken on initiation day are a lifetime commitment to justice, friendship, character and culture; for others, they are a ticket to four years of partying to be shattered like a bottle of champagne on the chapter house steps on graduation day. I am always amazed by those brothers without whose presence no party was complete, who are never heard from again following graduation.

Be assured that the long anticipated recolonization of DU at Syracuse University will be a colossal waste of time and effort unless there exists a strong local cadre of DU alumni to insure the chapter stays on the right path.

Like their hairlines, the ranks of active local DUs are thinning rapidly—with most of us well in our 60’s or beyond. And yet some 300 DU alumni from all chapters live in the Syracuse area. A few attend alumni meetings regularly, some give us an occasional hello, most avoid the fraternity like the plague, many are never heard from at all.

To be very honest, we haven’t given our local brethren much to be proud of in recent years. No DU is going to subject

himself or his family and friends to a shabby, trashy chapter house, or risk having his teenaged daughters mooned by undergraduate members (as I once witnessed). Or who needs a lawsuit from a sexual abuse, personal injury or negligent death situation? (Actually, fraternities are heavily insured and no alum has ever been wiped out by a lawsuit, but this popular perception persists.)

Within the past school year on more than one occasion, the “Daily Orange” reported that a greek chapter at SU had gone out of existence for lack of local alumni who wanted anything to do with their chapter.

While it’s easy to blame such a sad state of affairs on the undergrads, the alumni must share at least 50% of the blame. Strong, active alumni involvement simply hasn’t existed. The few alums who tried to set things straight were overwhelmed and overruled by undergraduates bent on their own agenda. Relations with the International Fraternity, always cordial, were distant—with few if any Syracuse DUs ever attending DU’s summer Leadership Institutes. Two outstanding exceptions were Tom McMahan ’52, who served as International Fraternity Vice President, and Rick Holland ’83, long-time DU Educational Foundation executive director.

If SU’s second-oldest fraternity is to successfully regain its historic and rightful position, an intensive recruiting campaign must be waged among all local DU alumni. From this group, hopefully sufficient numbers of loyal DUs will step forward, to be trained in good chapter management and the current college culture and assume the oversight positions crucial to the sustained existence of a top notch chapter. It’s simply not enough to get a chapter up and running, with all the accompanying bells and whistles. We must be prepared for the long run with continued recruitment of committed alums and ironclad assurances that no alum must remain active forever.

In essence, two chapters are needed at Syracuse—an active chapter second to none and an alumni chapter of concerned and aware DUs, with its own program of social activities and policies dedicated to perpetuate DU at SU through the next 100 years. ♦

Director of Judicial Affairs, Anastasia Urtz, Director of Greek Life Bill Longcore, and SU Vice President of Student Affairs Chuck Merrihew. The most cordial meeting was presided over by Ms. Urtz, a no-nonsense attorney, who has spent much of the past several years dealing with the less savory aspects of SU student life.

Ms. Urtz opened with her opinion that DU’s petition contained nothing new and her observation that she was looking at the same (tired?) alumni faces she saw five years ago when the chapter was suspended.

Abe Cross assured her that DU’s recolonization program was a time-tested blueprint for a successful DU chapter. In response to her assertion that we need more active local alums, especially younger and more culturally aware of the world of 18 year olds, Abe Cross assured her that these alumni would be recruited from the over 300 DU alumni living in the Syracuse area and would be trained and in place before a single undergraduate was recruited. Ms. Urtz also advised that her office had experienced much grief from the off-campus group calling

to recolonize, we would take the necessary steps to persuade the undergraduate group to find another name.

The meeting with SU adjourned on a pleasant note, with SU promising to “get back to us.” At a post-meeting recap at the University Sheraton’s Regatta Room, there was consensus that the meeting has been fruitful and that a renewed recruiting effort among local DUs was in order to insure the prolonged success of a new DU chapter. Abe Cross advised that no DU alum should be made to feel he is serving a “lifetime sentence” on the alumni board if he volunteers to become involved. There would be a guaranteed three-year “step down” date.

As of this writing, Abe Cross advises that he has heard nothing further from SU, but he has calls in to both the Greek and Judicial Affairs offices.

The University officials have assured us privately that they would welcome SU’s second oldest fraternity back on campus again, but with iron clad assurances and convincing evidence that DU will be an outstanding chapter in all respects.

The DU Society wishes to thank our International Executive Director Abraham Cross for all his efforts to date to insure our recolonization. Chapter recolonization will be thoroughly

Big Golden Anniversary Celebration in Store for Dikaia Foundation in 2002

Seems hard to believe, but Dikaia Foundation will celebrate its 50th anniversary in April of next year. It's the perfect occasion for a celebratory party, and that's what the Foundation is planning. Discussion regarding date(s) and site will take place at the annual meeting on June 2. Particulars will be announced soon after the June meeting, so keep posted.

Dikaia was incorporated as an Educational Foundation on April 23, 1952. The initial nine directors, all legends in Syracuse DU history, were Harold McBride, Clarence Keller, Tom Boggs, Lester (Deke) Wells, Bill Nichols, Bill Stark, Jr., George (Duke) Engren, Ray Haun and Harold (Pete) Dwyer. Of this group, Bill Stark is the lone survivor.

The Stephen Crane Endowment (see related article) was set up in part as a way of recognizing the big 50th birthday for Dikaia. During its lifetime, Dikaia has given about \$500,000 in scholarships and grants to Syracuse University and Syracuse students, most of them DUs. ♦

Delta Upsilon Lecture Series to Feature Noted Harvard Professor

The inaugural Stephen Crane/Delta Upsilon lecture, sponsored by Dikaia Foundation, will be given at Syracuse University by Professor Sacvan Bercovitch, a leading authority on American literature and a professor at Harvard. The announcement was made by Prof. Bob Gates, Chairman of the SU English Department and coordinator of the Crane series.

Dikaia's involvement with the Stephen Crane Lecture Series has prompted favorable reaction from the University. University sources have expressed surprise and delight that a social fraternity is taking the lead in enriching academic programs at Syracuse. "Delta Upsilon is setting a positive example for every Greek organization on campus", said Brandon Gordon, a development officer for the College of Arts and Sciences and an advisor to the local Sigma Nu chapter. The Office for Judicial Affairs, responsible for approving the colonization of new fraternities on campus, has taken note of DU's sponsorship of the lecture series through Dikaia. Professor Gates commented that by attracting top scholars to Syracuse, Dikaia "will help bolster the University's national reputation within the academic community."

Dr. Bercovitch is general editor of the Cambridge History of American Literature and author of numerous scholarly books and articles, including *The Rites of Assent* (1992), *The American Jeremiad* (1978) and *The Puritan Origins of the American Self* (1975). He is Professor of English and Comparative Literature at Harvard.

The inaugural lecture will be scheduled for a date in October and will be open to the public. Dikaia has guaranteed funding of the annual Stephen Crane lectures through 2006. ♦

Dikaia Announces Stephen Crane Endowment Campaign; Red Badge Pace Setters Introduced

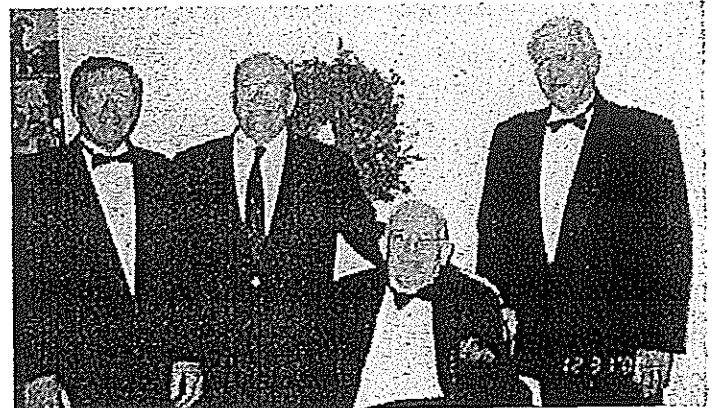
The Stephen Crane Endowment fundraising campaign is off to a great start, according to Dikaia President and Endowment Trustee Al Stauderman '58.

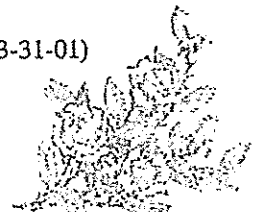
